The Lord detests all the proud of heart. Be sure of this: They will not go unpunished. (Prov. 16:5)

Since we have these promises, dear friends, let us purify ourselves from everything that contaminates body and spirit, perfecting holiness out of reverence for God. (2 Cor. 7:1)

David's sin with Bathsheba was a sin of the flesh, a yielding to lust after an afternoon of laziness, but the census was a sin of the spirit, a willful act of rebellion against God. It was motivated by pride, and pride is number one on the list of the sins that God hates. Warren Wiersbe

Sermon Outline:

- i. David's own heart condemned him no one confronted him in his sin.
- David's heart condemned him after he had counted the fighting men (vs.10 NKJV).
- ii. David's own heart condemned him not because of WHAT he did, but WHY he did it.
- But why does my lord the king want to do such a thing? (vs. 3)
- iii. David's own heart condemned him because he knew others would suffer for his sin.
- I am the one who has sinned and done wrong. These are but sheep. What have they done? (vs. 17)
- iv. David's own heart condemned him because he was a man after God's own heart.
- I will not sacrifice to the Lord my God burnt offerings that cost me nothing. (vs. 24)

<u>Question for Reflection / Discussion:</u> What experience have you had with your heart condemning you, with your sin affecting others around you, and your prayer for mercy resulting in God's peace?
