But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth. (Acts 1:8)

On that day a great persecution broke out against the church at Jerusalem, and all except the apostles were scattered throughout Judea and Samaria... Those who had been scattered preached the Word wherever they went. (Acts 8:1, 4)

iii. How did God use persecution to accomplish His purposes in the early Church? What might have happened if it had not come? Is persecution necessary for faith to be vibrant? (cf. Acts 8:1 - 4)

iv. What did the gospel do when it arrived in Samaria (cf. Acts 8:5 - 25)? What are some authentic signs of the gospel penetrating a society and people?
